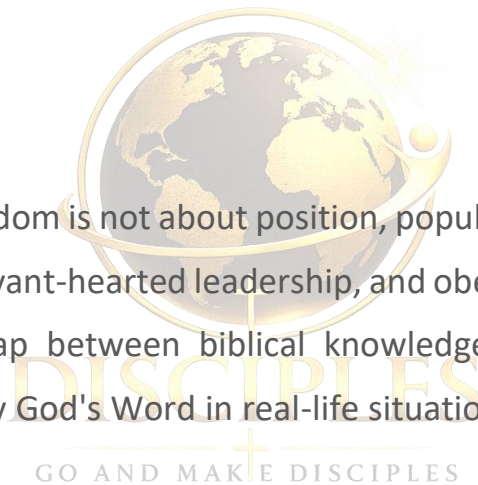
Key Scripture

Lesson 2: The Character of a Godly Leader

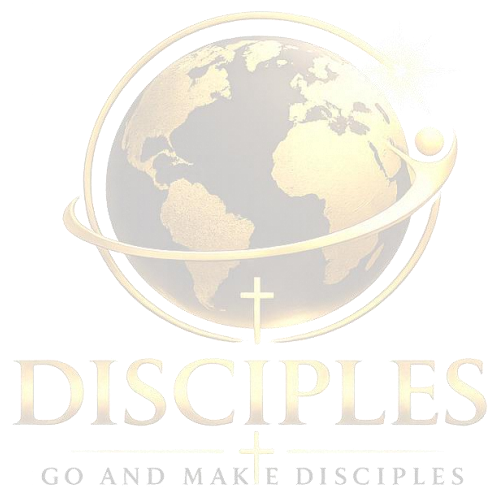
Key Scriptures

Lesson 4: Shepherding People Well

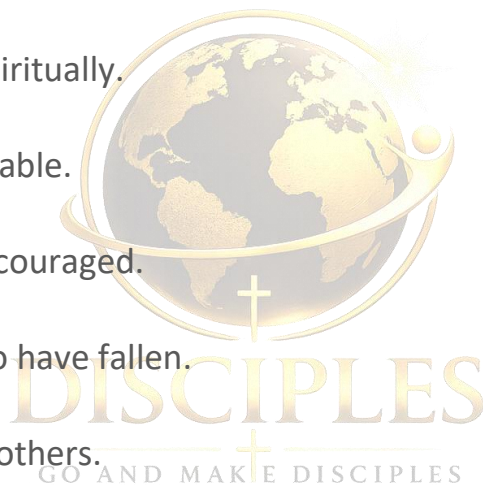
Key Scriptures
