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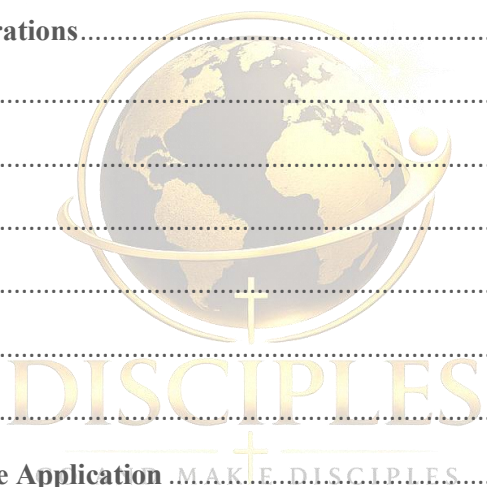
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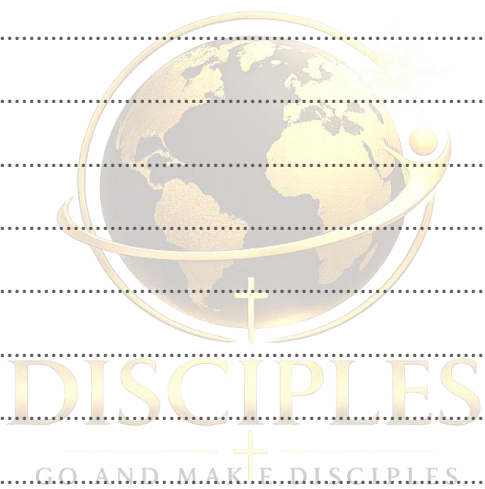
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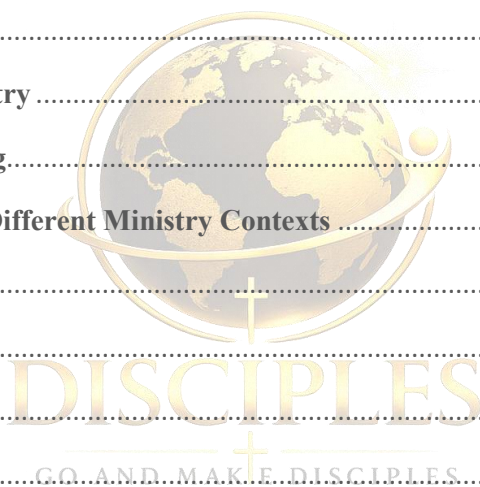
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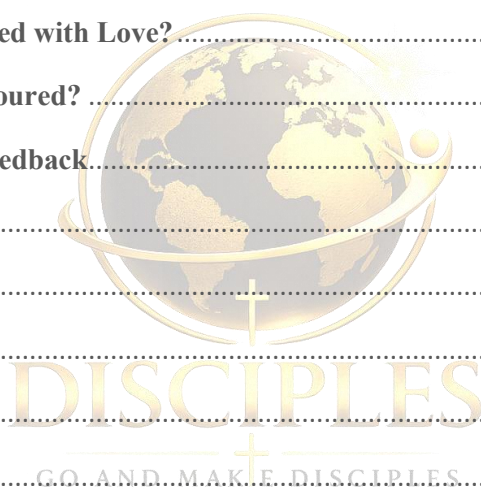
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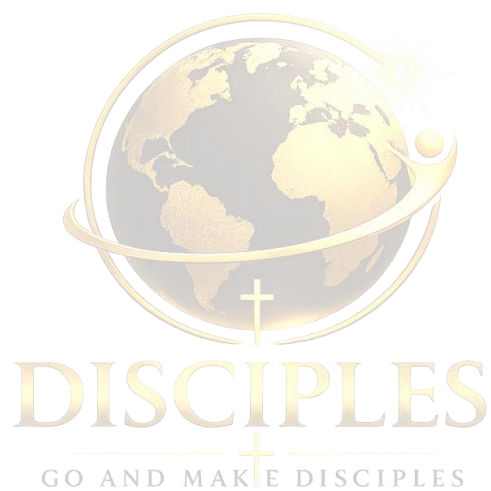
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# Course Title: Homiletics: Preaching the Word

## MODULE 1: The Theology and Calling of Biblical Preaching

### Key Scriptures

*"Preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching."* **2 Timothy 4:2**

*"How then will they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in Him of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone preaching?"*  
**Romans 10:14**

*"The Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon Me, because the LORD has anointed Me to bring good news to the poor."* **Isaiah 61:1**

## Introduction

From the opening chapters of Genesis to the closing words of Revelation, God reveals Himself as a God who speaks. He created the universe by His spoken word (Genesis 1), called His servants through His voice, spoke through the prophets, revealed Himself fully in His Son Jesus Christ, and continues to speak today through His written Word as it is faithfully proclaimed.

Preaching therefore occupies a central place in God's redemptive plan. It is not merely a religious lecture, motivational speech, or public address. It is God's appointed means of communicating His

truth to humanity. Whenever Scripture is faithfully explained under the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit, God Himself addresses His people through His Word.

The discipline of **Homiletics** equips God's servants to prepare and deliver biblical messages with faithfulness, clarity, conviction, and compassion. It combines biblical interpretation, theological reflection, spiritual formation, and effective communication so that the preacher proclaims not personal opinions but the timeless truth of God's Word.

This module lays the theological foundation for the entire course. Before learning how to prepare sermons, students must first understand why preaching exists, who has the authority to preach, what character God requires of His messengers, and how the preacher's life shapes the credibility of the message. As the apostle Paul reminded Timothy, the preacher is called to "preach the Word" rather than personal philosophies or cultural opinions (2 Timothy 4:2).

## 1.1 What is Homiletics?

The word **Homiletics** comes from the Greek word *homilia*, meaning **conversation, instruction, or discourse**. In Christian ministry, Homiletics refers to the study and practice of preparing and delivering biblical sermons.

Homiletics is both an art and a science. It is an art because effective preaching requires wisdom, creativity, clarity, and sensitivity to listeners. It is a science because it follows sound principles of biblical interpretation, logical organisation, and careful communication. Above all, it is a spiritual discipline because true biblical preaching depends upon the work of the Holy Spirit.

A sermon is more than information about God; it is the faithful proclamation of God's truth intended to transform lives. Biblical preaching seeks not merely to educate the mind but also to convict the conscience, strengthen faith, encourage obedience, comfort the broken-hearted, and glorify Jesus Christ.

Therefore, Homiletics is not primarily about becoming an impressive speaker. Its ultimate purpose is to prepare faithful servants who rightly handle the Word of God and communicate it with humility, love, and spiritual power.

## 1.2 The Divine Origin of Preaching

Preaching did not originate with human ingenuity. It originated with God Himself.

Throughout Scripture, God repeatedly chose individuals to proclaim His message to His people. Rather than communicating through human philosophy, entertainment, or political influence, God raised up faithful messengers who declared, "**Thus says the Lord.**"

The preacher therefore stands in a long line of God's servants who have proclaimed His Word throughout history.

The authority of preaching lies not in eloquence or personality but in the message that is proclaimed. As Martin Luther observed, "The Word of God cannot be without the people of God, and the people of God cannot be without the Word of God."

When preaching faithfully explains Scripture, it becomes God's appointed means of instructing, correcting, encouraging, warning, and strengthening His Church.

## 1.3 Why Biblical Preaching Matters

God has always used preaching to accomplish His purposes among His people.

Biblical preaching matters because it:

### **Proclaims the Gospel**

The primary purpose of preaching is to announce the good news of salvation through Jesus Christ.

Faith comes by hearing the Word of God (Romans 10:17). Through preaching, sinners hear the message of repentance, forgiveness, grace, and eternal life.

### **Reveals God's Truth**

Preaching opens the Scriptures so that believers understand God's character, His will, and His redemptive plan.

Without faithful preaching, many believers remain spiritually immature because they lack a clear understanding of God's Word.

### **Calls People to Repentance**

Throughout Scripture, prophets, apostles, and Jesus Himself called people to turn from sin and return to God.

True preaching confronts sin with love while extending God's invitation to forgiveness through Christ.

### **Strengthens Believers**

The Church grows through consistent teaching of God's Word.

Faithful preaching:

- Encourages perseverance.
- Builds spiritual maturity.
- Provides hope during suffering.

- Strengthens faith.
- Equips believers for ministry.

## **Builds the Church**

Healthy churches are built upon sound biblical preaching.

While programmes, music, and activities may support church life, Scripture consistently places preaching at the centre of congregational worship.

## **Glorifies Jesus Christ**

Every faithful sermon ultimately points people to Christ.

Jesus declared that the Scriptures testify about Him (John 5:39). Whether preaching from the Old or New Testament, the preacher should reveal God's redemptive work fulfilled in Jesus Christ.

# **1.4 Biblical Examples of Preaching**

The Bible presents numerous examples of faithful preaching.

Each messenger served in a unique historical context, yet all proclaimed God's truth with courage and obedience.

## **Moses**

Moses served as God's spokesman to Israel.

He proclaimed God's law, instructed the people in covenant faithfulness, and repeatedly called Israel to obedience.

His farewell sermons in the Book of Deuteronomy remain among the greatest examples of biblical preaching.

## **The Prophets**

Prophets such as Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Amos, and Micah faithfully proclaimed God's Word despite opposition.

Their messages included:

- Calls to repentance.
- Warnings of judgment.
- Promises of restoration.
- Hope in the coming Messiah.

They demonstrated remarkable courage by speaking God's truth regardless of public opinion.

## John the Baptist

John prepared the way for Jesus Christ.

His message was simple, direct, and uncompromising:

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

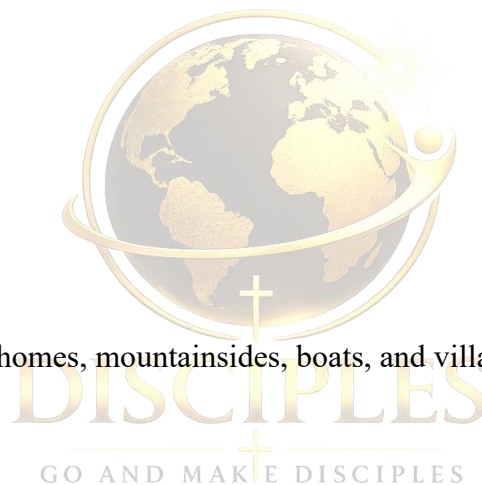
John reminds preachers that faithfulness is more important than popularity.

Faithfulness does not always produce popularity.

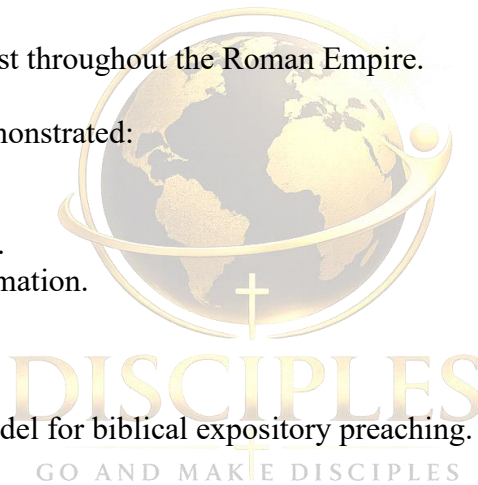
## Paul

# 1.5 The Biblical Foundation of Preaching

- Preach personal experiences.

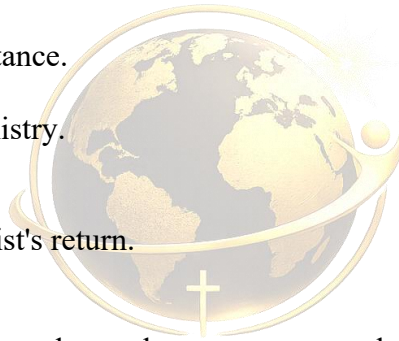
Rather, he commanded Timothy to proclaim God's revealed truth faithfully.

### **Integrity**

Faithfulness, honesty, and moral consistency protect both the preacher and the congregation.

### **Prayerfulness**

Powerful preaching begins in private prayer long before public proclamation.

Prayer prepares both the preacher and the hearers.

### **Compassion**

The preacher should love people deeply.

Biblical preaching seeks to restore rather than merely criticise.

### **Courage**

Faithful preaching sometimes requires proclaiming unpopular truths.

Like the prophets and apostles, preachers must fear God more than people.

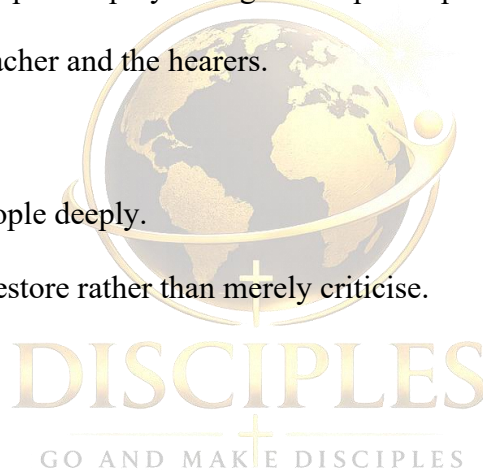
### **Dependence upon the Holy Spirit**

- Continual spiritual growth.

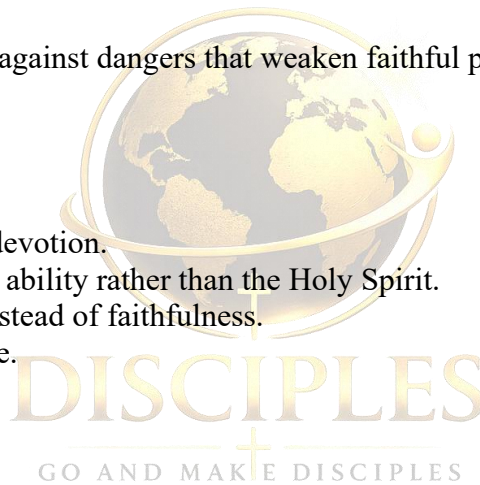
Sermon preparation begins on one's knees before it begins at the study desk.

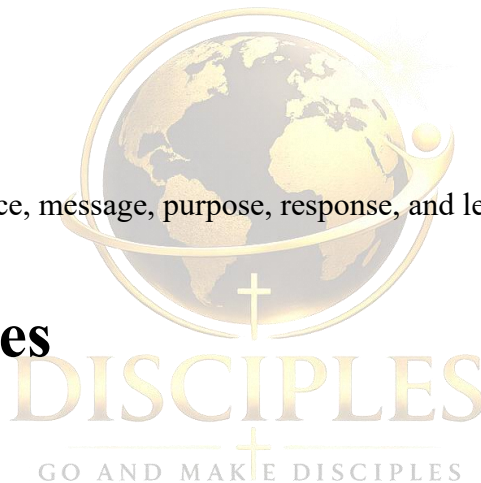

## Summary

## Introduction

Every faithful sermon begins long before the preacher stands behind a pulpit. It begins in prayer, continues through careful study of God's Word, and culminates in the faithful proclamation of biblical truth under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Many people mistakenly assume that preaching is simply speaking well before an audience. However, effective biblical preaching is the result of diligent preparation. The preacher serves as a steward of God's Word and therefore has the sacred responsibility of handling Scripture accurately, reverently, and responsibly.

Sermon preparation is not merely an academic exercise. It is an act of worship. The preacher approaches Scripture not as a critic but as a servant who first listens to God's voice before speaking to God's people. Every sermon should emerge from a careful process of prayer, study, interpretation, reflection, and application.

In this module, students will learn the biblical principles of sermon preparation. They will discover how to choose appropriate sermon texts, interpret Scripture faithfully, understand different sermon types, organise biblical material into clear outlines, and communicate God's truth with accuracy and relevance. By mastering these principles, future ministers will be equipped to preach messages that are faithful to Scripture, centred on Christ, and applicable to contemporary life.

## 2.1 Choosing a Sermon Text

Every sermon begins with Scripture. The authority of preaching rests not upon the preacher's ideas but upon God's revealed Word.

Selecting a sermon text requires spiritual discernment, careful prayer, and thoughtful consideration. A preacher should never choose a passage merely because it is familiar, popular, or easy to preach. Instead, the selection of Scripture should be guided by the Holy Spirit and informed by the needs of the congregation while remaining faithful to the whole counsel of God.

A well-chosen text provides the foundation upon which every other aspect of the sermon is built.

### Principles for Choosing a Sermon Text

A suitable sermon text should:

- Be inspired by Scripture rather than personal opinion.
- Be understood within its literary and historical context.
- Reveal God's truth clearly.
- Be appropriate for the intended audience.
- Point ultimately to Jesus Christ.
- Offer opportunities for practical application.
- Encourage spiritual growth and transformation.

While addressing these needs, the preacher must avoid allowing public opinion to dictate the message. God's Word remains the final authority.

## 2.3 Preaching the Whole Counsel of God

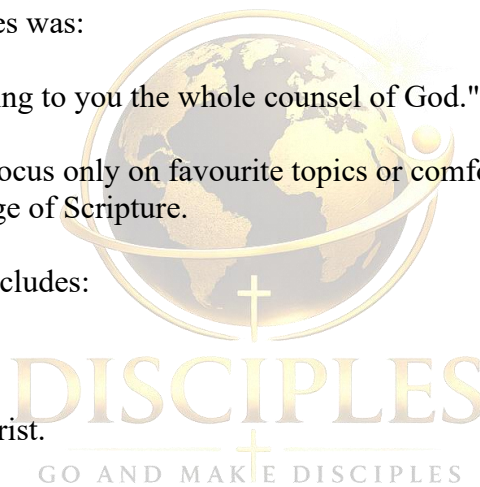
One of Paul's final testimonies was:

Faithful preaching does not focus only on favourite topics or comforting passages. Instead, it presents the complete message of Scripture.

The whole counsel of God includes:

- Salvation through Christ.
- Repentance.
- Grace.

Balanced preaching nourishes believers with the full richness of God's Word.

## 2.4 Interpreting the Biblical Text

Before preaching a passage, the preacher must first understand its original meaning.

Interpretation seeks to answer the question:

- Cultural customs.

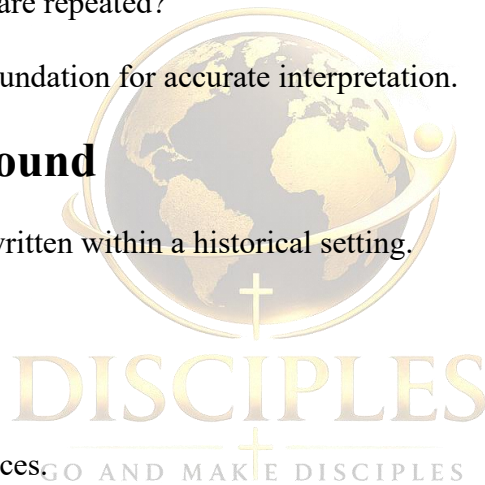
Understanding historical context often clarifies difficult passages.

Expository preaching remains the primary model for systematic biblical teaching because it allows God's Word to shape the sermon.

### Textual Sermons

A textual sermon is built around one primary biblical text.

The main divisions arise from the selected passage itself.

Textual sermons are especially useful for:

- Special occasions.
- Evangelistic services.
- Doctrinal teaching.
- Short sermon series.

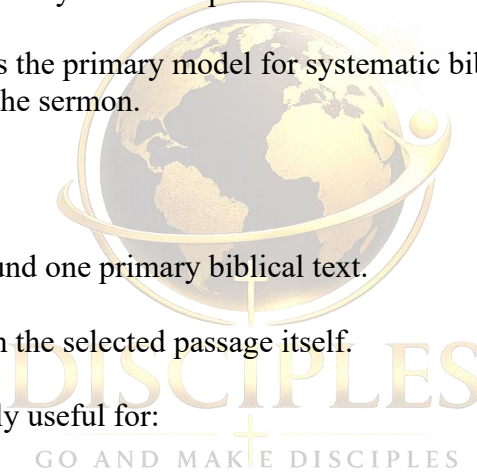
The preacher must avoid taking verses out of context simply because they fit a desired theme.

Most sermons contain between two and four major points.

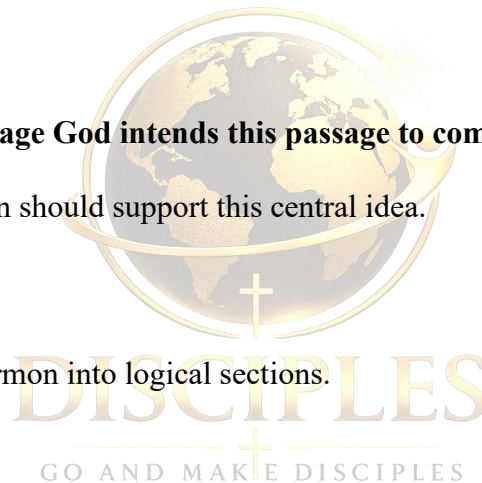
# Supporting Scriptures

## Practical Application

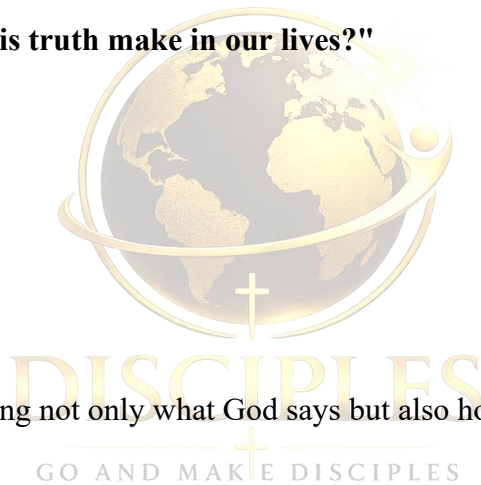
Every sermon should answer the question:

Preachers should guard against common errors, including:

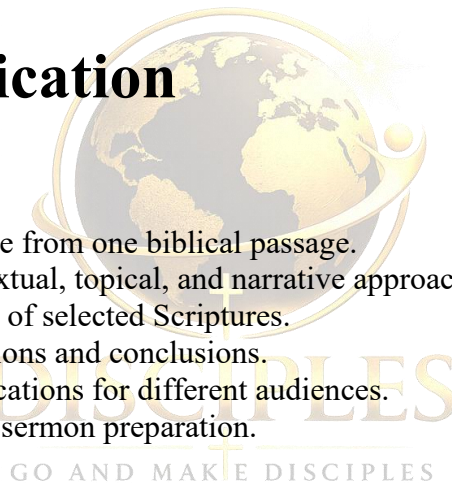
- Choosing a topic before studying Scripture.

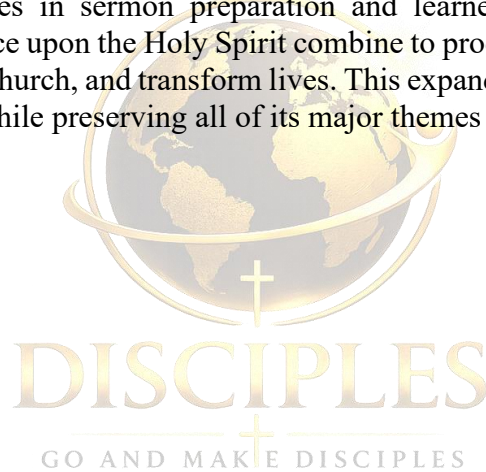

Effective preaching therefore combines accurate interpretation with clear communication. The preacher must faithfully explain God's Word while also helping people understand what it means for their daily lives. This requires wisdom, compassion, cultural awareness, and dependence upon the Holy Spirit.

In this module, students will explore the principles of effective communication in preaching. They will learn how to use illustrations wisely, develop meaningful applications, preach Christ from all Scripture, improve sermon delivery, and rely upon the Holy Spirit as the true source of spiritual power in ministry.

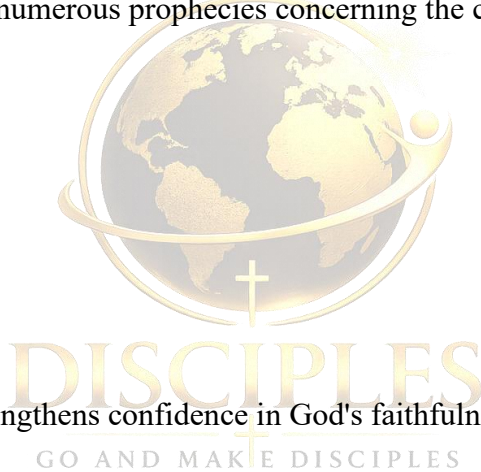

The preacher should never imitate another preacher's personality.

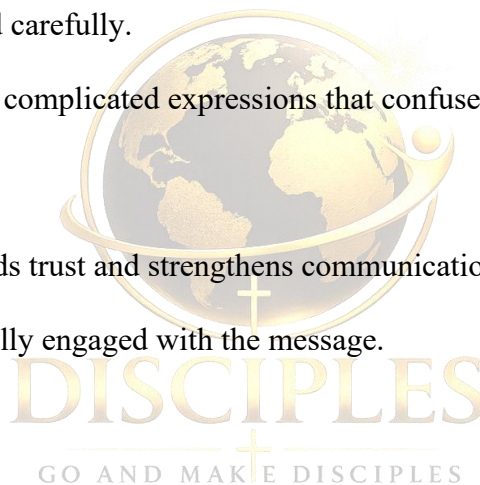

This module explores how faithful biblical preaching can be adapted to different ministry settings without changing the unchanging message of God's Word.

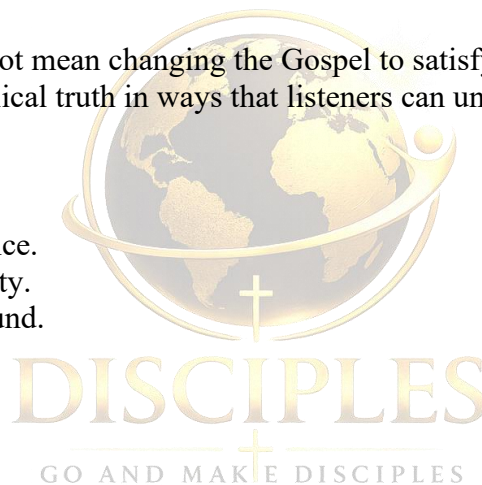
## 4.1 Knowing Your Audience
